
Mike McCoy is also a spectacular fly tyer, tying hundreds of flies annually for use by world famous European fly fishing competitors, the originators of the Czech technique!

Carmen Reservoir Outing
Thursday, June 1, 2017
Outing Host, Rod Roth

Distance from Eugene/Springfield area, 77 miles, (travel time about 1hour 30 min.):

Directions from Eugene:

Take Hwy 126 east thru Springfield. <u>Continue for 65 miles</u>. Take a left onto NF-750. Look for the street sign marked <u>Carmen Diversion Reservoir</u> if you come to the (<u>ICE Cap Campground</u>) you have gone too far, go back a short distance turn (R). Continue on a good dirt road keeping (R) for approximately 0.4 miles. You will come to a large parking area. Do not go over the bridge. The Reservoir is on the (L). Entry to the reservoir is at the information sign at the edge of the Water. Ease of entry can vary due to the water level. There are other entry points a short distance over the bridge, to the (R). There is a Forest Service bathroom a short distance further on. *Car pooling is recommended*.

Meeting Time:

We will meet at the parking area, as described, @ Carmen at 09:00 AM.

Flotation Equipment:

Motors are not allowed. Non-motorized drift boats, pontoon boats, and float tubes are all great methods to access the fishing. All skill levels are perfect for this impoundment, from beginners to the advanced. Water is typically calm and well protected. The water is very cold. Make sure that you are wearing thermal under garments.

Fishing Equipment:

The reservoir is a diversion for power production. The water is exceptionally clear and has alternating deep sections 4-18 feet. The trout are planted rainbow trout, 8—16 inches. Fishing is best done using a sink tip or full sinking line. Leader length is 7--9 feet, tippet 3.5 to 4 pound weight. Recommended wet flies are gold bead,10—12 wooly bugger (black marabou with silver flash on tail-- or olive), hare's ear, prince nymph, A Callibaetis hatch is possible with good weather. A 5 fish limit is in effect.

Treats - Lunch:

The group will reconvene together at lunchtime 11:30 to 12:00. Bring your own meal, treats and beverage.

Apparel/Camera:

Weather has been variable in the past years. Raining to sunny, warm weather. Wear clothing appropriate to the temperature and conditions.

Be sure to remember your camera (waterproof sack and tethered) and take photos to share our fishing adventures for the newsletter and/or the CFF website.

North Twin Lake Outing

May 20, 2017

Trip Host: Bob Wolfe

North Twin is a small natural Cascade Lake about 2 ¼ hours from Eugene and is a wonderful, day trip, fly fishing destination. Being a small lake and stocked with nice sized Rainbows, North Twin is a great place for beginning fly fishers as well as old veterans. The lake can be fished from shore or a floating device. Great place for beginning float tubers. We will be meeting at the boat launch around 9:30 and fish until about 5 PM or until you are tired. Pack a good lunch and snacks as we will not be taking time out of prime fishing for a get together lunch. Carpooling is recommended as there is not a lot of parking area.

Directions:

Follow Hwy 58 toward Bend. About 12 miles past Willamette Pass look for the Crescent Cut-off on the Left. Follow the Crescent cut-off for about 4 miles to the Cascade Lakes highway on the left. Proceed on the Cascade Lakes Highway for about 17 miles and watch for Forest Service Road 42, also known as Century Drive. Take a right onto FS 42 and go about 3 ½ miles to the Twin Lakes Resort road on the right. North Twin is the next left, about ¼ mile. For camping opportunities, check with Twin Lakes Resort at 541/382-6432.

Recommended equipment:

4-6 wt. rod with floating line and intermediate sinking line for those who like to troll. There are lots of large fish so a good net is a must and good 4 to 6 LB. tippet material. Fluorocarbon recommended.

Being early season, the fish will be feeding primarily on Chironomids but a Callibaetis May Fly hatch can come on at any time. Be prepared with size 14-16 Parachute Adams or similar dry flies. Size 14 Black or Black/Red Chironomids and a supply of Wooly buggers and Leach patterns should fill the bill. Be prepared to fish Chironomids under an indicator.

Bring warm clothing as spring weather can be cool and/or wet. Bad weather can be very good fishing if you are prepared.



Mill Race Diary By Kat Paiva

Truthfully, I was volunteer shamed into it. You're familiar with the situation – someone comes up to you with a Volunteer Sign-up sheet, one with no firm commitment dates, and no explanation of what it is you will be doing, and says "everyone else has signed up." I wasn't quick enough with an excuse and everyone else was doing it, so I *had* to sign-up.

I had volunteered for the Springfield Mill Race Fish Sampling project. CFF has partnered with ODFW to help determine the movement patterns of trout and other fish that use the Mill Race as habitat. How I was going help in doing this was as yet unknown.

Time passes.

Training day arrives. We meet at a Springfield park, split into groups and march to the edge of a rushing, too-much-cream-in-my-coffee-colored Mill Race at the 28th Street Bridge. Our ODFW representative hops in the water and it's up to his chest. I gulp loudly and notice others around me doing the same. With my luck, I'd take a header and nose dredge my way downstream before anyone could catch me. In my head I'm thinking, "no way I'm doing this."

With the help of CFF member Floyd Wooton, he and ODFW guy wrestle/roll something the size of a chicken wire Volkswagen to the shore, open it up, and find a couple of little fish. (I am disappointed – guess I was expecting a steelhead or something.) We drug the little guys and measure them and set about guessing what they are. There are many choices including cutthroats, rainbow trout, redband trout, lamprey eel, sunfish, and largescale suckers. We haven't a clue, so ODFW guy decides for us and recommends we study Field Guide to Common Fish of the Willamette Valley Floodplain.

After determining origin, we test the water temp, note the weather, the water flow, determine whether or not the fish has been tagged (if he's a trout), clip his caudle fin, upper or lower, depending on the location, record the date, the names of the samplers, the trap location, and move to the next trap. Again I say to myself, "there's no way I'm doing this."

Time passes.

Roz and I volunteer to help with a Beginning Fly Fishing class up in Vida and on the way home we decide to stop at the Booth Kelly trap location where Steve, Trese, Michelle, and Floyd are starting their shift. We make our way down to the river and the six of us start checking the traps. Me on the shore of course, providing commentary, as this is an experienced crew. The crew toss the large and heavy "holding" rocks (as if they were marshmallows) off the smaller traps, net their discoveries into a bucket and whisk them to shore. It was very exciting to see what each trap held. Exciting in that you never know what you'll find, and the water had gone down. Jim Breedlove shows up and Guess What Fish This Is By (a large) Committee commences. It's a crack-up and fun. Hmmm, maybe I could do this.

More time passes.....

I commit to a date with Roz, Betty, and our muscle guy, Floyd. Betty and I pick up the equipment outside the ODFW office – to open the box one stands and bends upside down (similar to finding a stall in the ladies restroom), fixes the code on the double locks and yanks. This is not always a successful endeavor and may require some mild cursing or other body contorting to see the lock, double check the combination, and yank it "just right." Bingo! The locks open, we stuff the van with life jackets, nets and buckets, date sheets, the fish ID book, scissors, the measuring board, knock-out drops, a First Aid Kit, safety equipment, the PIT tag Reader, and we head off to the BK traps.

We wadered up, threw on our PFD's and mucked our way to the shoreline with our equipment. It was raining, sunny, and cloudy ... simultaneously. Our first trap yields some pretty chubby pollywogs, and three fish. Again, we employ the Guess What Fish This Is by Committee, and write our determination on the ODFW sampling sheet. We found a trout in the hoop trap and got to wave the PIT scanner (fatter than a Fairy Godmother wand and but more Star Wars looking than a grocery store hand-held scanner) over it to see if it had been tagged. It had been and we recorded its numbers on our sheet, if not, we'd have left it in a special tube in the river for ODFW to come out insert a small tracking device.

Then we hopped in our cars and headed for the 28th Street Bridge location. Driving there I'm thinking, "This is fun. And much more enjoyable than spreading gravel on paths at Delta Ponds." I feel more of a connection to our sport participating through this activity. In the water, with other club members and with the fish – learning where they go and why, and discovering species I didn't even know lived in our waterways.

So, I signed up again ... and again. If you haven't signed up and been trained for the Mill Race Sampling Project -- do it! You're interacting with other club members, learning more about Oregon fish and their habitat, and helping preserve and protect this particular habitat for present and future generations. Plus, it's a blast!

PS. And yes, I was wearing two right shoes that day, all through my own fault!


Plans are in the works
