


Gold Lake Trip Report (by Glenn Miller)

It would be good to keep this outing on the calendar in upcoming years as it's easy to fish and is not far (1 1/2 hours) from the Springfield/Eugene area.

This year's outing to Erma Bell lakes was once again a successful trip. Eleven CFF members made the five mile roundtrip hike into Middle Erma Bell and most did the hike for the two days. We had tons of fun, caught fish, enjoyed good camaraderie, and ate like royalty. We definitely got our exercise for the weekend. Unlike last year, when it rained every day, this year treated us to dry weather. The first day (Friday) had a forecast of rain but other than an overcast sky and cool temperatures, it turned out to be a good day. Saturday was beautiful with a few wispy clouds and a very comfortable temperature. As in most previous years, the mosquitoes were not too bad; a few during the first day but hardly any during the evening dinner and breakfast the next day.

The Hareline - Dubbin Story

bout three weeks ago, I received a phone call from Bob Borden the owner of Hareline Dubbin, a major provider of fly tying materials located in Monroe, Oregon. He had been an early member of CFF, a fly fishing guide and a commercial fly tier with a number of commercial accounts. As he reports "I was getting burned out" and decided that continuing his activities with the CFF was something he could let go and pick up again when he had more time.

One of his commercial accounts to whom Bob sold flies was a local Eugene Fly Shop called "The Caddis Fly." He had become a close friend of Bob Guard, the owner of the Caddis Fly Shop at the time. Borden had expressed his feeling of burn-out and his desire to cut down on his commercial tying responsibilities to Guard and It just so happened that one of Guard's suppliers of fly-tying materials too had gone out of business and Guard was looking for a new supplier. Guard knew that Borden had been experimenting with dying dubbing and told him that if he would find the rabbit pelts and dye them in assorted colors, he would buy them to sell in his shop. From that relationship "Hareline Dubbin" was founded.

The growth and commercialization of Hareline took off and the need for additional employees to meet the need for Hareline products expanded far more than ever expected. Without formal advertising except by word-of-mouth, the demand expanded across the United States, Canada, Europe, and into Japan, Russia, Turkey, New Zealand, Australia, and South America. Borden started his commercial fly tying materials venture in 1981 and in 33 years it had expanded roughly around the globe.

Borden grew up in Siletz, Oregon along the Siletz River, one of the most fished steelhead and salmon rivers in Oregon, where he honed his fishing skills and became a much sought-after fishing guide. With the rapid expansion of his tying material production and distribution, now with 22+ employees, his guiding too had to be put on hold, and then it happened. He received an offer to sell his company which would have been in 2015 or 2016. The business was finally sold in 2016.

Needless to say, the business "Hareline Dubbin" had provided a comfortable living for Borden and his family and he never took for granted that it was the loyal fly fishing community that was responsible for its success. As he contemplated his business success, he began thinking about how to reward these same loyal supporters for the success of his company. What came to mind was a providing substantial donation to the CFF to be used to provide grants to Fly Fishing Clubs for conservation, educational events, fly fishing skill training, and the purchase of fly fishing equipment to be used for youth oriented activities offered through the grants. It was this idea that had prompted Borden to give me a call and see if his idea was workable. I told him it was and that the grant plan was used by many clubs and the Oregon Council Fly Fishers International organization. We decided to keep the idea on the down-low until the details could be worked out. I had to approach our CFF President and get his support. Borden had to get with his accountant and see what the details of providing such a grant were and to make sure that the donation would be tax-deductible; and that's where the first hiccup came in. The CFF is a 401c7 club, which meant that a donation to the CFF would not meet the tax-deductible requirement. After consulting with Sherry Steele, President of the Oregon Council of the International Federation of Fly Fishers, she said that this would not be a problem as the International Fly Fishers organization is a 501c3 and the donation could be awarded to the Oregon Council IFFF.

At the first annual meeting of the Oregon Council of the International Fly Fishers held on June 10, 2017 at the Comfort Inn in Albany, OR, Borden was introduced and given time to tell the story behind the Hareline Dubbin success. He then gave a substantial donation to The Oregon Council in the middle of a rousing ovation. Grant applications will be sent to all Fly Fishers International Oregon Council Clubs in good standing. Funding opportunities will be announced; grants received and selected for funding will be published in the Oregon Council News and the Fly Fisher magazine. Thank you Bob and Nelda Borden for your great generosity and continued support of the exciting experience of fly fishing. Thanks also go to Bob Guard for having the foresight to get Bob Borden into the fly tying materials business. Continued success to all.

Bob Wolfe has been fishing at Diamond Lake and he sent me this photo of a Tiger Trout he caught there in June. I have to confess, I didn't know anything about tiger trout before Bob sent me this photo so I did a little research.

What I learned was that in 2006 Diamond Lake was poisoned with rotenone ridding it of tui chub, an invasive bait fish. Fast forward ten years to 2015 and routine monitoring discovered one tui chub. To prevent another tui chub invasion biologists decided to stock the lake with tiger trout, the hope is that the sterile trout will prey on any invasive fish.

All together 18,000 tiger trout were released into Diamond Lake in 2016. If you do catch one this year let it go as tiger trout are catch and release only.
